1. Site Comparison

Both sites are focused on sharing teacher resources. Teachers Pay Teachers has a wide variety of subjects and grade levels to search for resources, where as Chemmybear is focused on just chemistry (general and AP). Teachers Pay Teachers looks more like a profession designed it with its content tucked away until you select what you are looking for based off of the criteria on the left side of the page. Chemmybear has less of a professional look to it and all of the categories of resources are listed on the main page, grid like, with descriptions for each link.

2. Strengths and Weaknesses

Design

Teachers Pay Teachers

The design of this website is pretty easy to figure out. At the top of the website, it gives you choices to login or search for content. What I really like about this site is that there are choices along the left column of the site that gives you choices to narrow your search by subject, grade level, price, and types of resources. As you select these choices, your search narrows to the right of the list giving you your options. As a result, you never really leave the home page (unless you select a resource), so it is easy to start a new search if needed.

Chemmybear

This website seems to put almost everything right on the main page. It is aimed toward general chemistry and AP chemistry, but the content seems to be mixed. Many of the links that you click on can take you to a whole new page with someone else's resources. Using this page you really need to know what you are looking for.

Content

Teachers Pay Teachers

This site has a lot of content. One could return to this page for each unit or subject they are teaching and keep finding new resources. Looking for the content is not difficult to find, because when you use the sidebar to select your content, you are not leaving the

home page. You know that the content is current, because there are up to date ratings on the pages with the resources.

Chemmybear

All of the links on this website are spread out on the main page, but they do have a brief description for each so the user knows what they are getting into. All links are function, but it is hard to tell how up to date they are. The AP chemistry test has changed within recent years, and it is hard to tell if this website's resources have been updated. However, there is still a lot of content that is still useful for a chemistry teacher and there are useful links to other external resources.

Credibility

It is very easy to find those responsible for the website using the About Us choice at the top of the webpage. A story about why they exist, all affiliations, and a way to email them can be found here. I believe the website is bias free, because its content has a large variety.

Chemmybear

It is hard to tell who is in charge of this website. I believe it is a teacher in Pasadena CA, because a lot of the handouts have that written on them. There is not a link on the page related to an About Us and I have not been able to find how to contact them.
